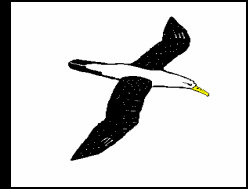


Tahuna News

Self Defence

Girls from eight of the Year 8 classes participated in the Self Defence project, which was run by Girls' Self Defence Project Aotearoa NZ. The instructor helped the girls deal with unsafe situations. This included how to deal with being followed, obscene phone calls, acquaintance and stranger attacks, and how to kick and punch. Although the girls learnt physical techniques, the course emphasised how to think ways out of threatening situations and telling someone about it afterwards. The feedback was all positive and many of the girls felt it was informative, empowering and of value to them. We are grateful to both instructors for the workshops.

Internet Problems

This term we have had several parents mention concerns re students bebo sites. This type of social networking site can be wonderful for families and friends sharing their adventures in life, but can be problematic for youngsters.

It is recommended that computers young students use are in the living area of your house, and that the screen is facing out into the room. Parents are encouraged to discuss what is being shared on these sites, and if there is any hesitancy about seeing the site, this would signal concerns.
